

Municipality of East Ferris

Community Safety and Well Being - 2022 Progress Report

In 2021, as recommended by the East Ferris Police Services Board, the Municipality approved a Community Safety and Wellness Plan (CSWBP). The Plan provides direction for East Ferris, highlighting opportunities for greater integration by community organizations to prevent difficult situations from escalating into a safety or health crisis. It focuses on the root causes of social problems to reduce crime and improve well-being. A CSWBP Advisory Committee was formed to monitor the progress of the Plan and to determine if there are emerging social issues of concern. Following is the 2022 Progress Report.

The CSWBP Advisory Committee has identified 3 new issues for the Municipality to address.

- Safety of children traveling to school by bus
 - Incidents have been reported of motorists not following school bus stop laws. The Advisory Committee concluded that the safety of East Ferris children is paramount when boarding and exiting school buses on local roads. A regional working committee was formed to engage in the "Let's Remember Adam" campaign and the City of North Bay took the lead. Advocacy efforts resulted in the provincial government passing Bill 246, better known as the Safer School Bus Act. This legislation requires all

school buses to be equipped with an eight-light orange-red warning system by July 1, 2022.

- There are concerns about infant and child nutrition in East Ferris.
 - The East Ferris CSWBP survey identified food insecurity issues affecting some families in the community. The concern is how many infants/children are being affected by these incidents of household food insecurity. The Committee heard from an informed citizen who spoke of the need for an "infant food bank" at the new East Ferris Medical Center. The Advisory Committee concluded that more information is needed to better understand the prevalence of the problem in East Ferris. Questions have been added to the community child care survey and responses are expected in July.

- East Ferris has experienced an increase in domestic disturbance calls from 26 calls in 2020 to 45 calls in 2021.
 - East Ferris PSB and the Municipality supported the North Bay OPP detachment in its advocacy that resulted in the addition of a mobile crisis response team as well as the addition of specialized resources to respond to East Ferris domestic conflict and mental health calls for service. The PSB will monitor the situation through an analysis of the ongoing calls for service and consultation with the OPP.
